I excitedly told him that after all these years I would be filling his requests to teach Hebrews in Addis Ababa. He said he had a surprise for me in that he would be my translator!

Within the Mekanisa Compound is a thriving school for deaf children, a medical complex, deep-well water system (that blesses the neighborhood with abundant and safe water supplies), a World Bible School center, a local congregation, and beginning construction of a well thought out multipurpose facility. I've seen very few such useful and practical implementations of such a facility.

Jim Wilson is doing an excellent job of directing the bible institute. He and his wife Deborah go above and beyond in making many sacrifices for the effort. Especially in the arduous travel. (And in the many favors and hospitality shown to us.)

As for the school. What an amazing and competent group of men. All in love with the Lord and his Word. Interested, studious, courteous, and scholarly.
